St Stephen, the First Martyr (Feast) – 26 December:

St Stephen (+c.35) the Proto-martyr was one of the seven deacons who assisted the Twelve, 'filled with faith and with the Holy Spirit' and 'full of fortitude'. Denounced to the Jewish authorities as a blasphemer, he was stoned to death outside Jerusalem. He died praying for those who killed him; present at his martyrdom was Saul of Tarsus, soon to become the Apostle of the Gentiles.

St John, Apostle and Evangelist (Feast) – 27 December:

St John (+c.100) was the son of Zebedee and worked as a Galilean fisherman with his brother St James. He was called while mending his nets to follow Jesus and become 'the disciple whom Jesus loved'. Alone among the Twelve, he stood at the foot of the cross and was entrusted to the Blessed Virgin. He wrote the fourth Gospel, three Epistles and the Apocalypse, producing profound passages on such themes as the divinity of Christ and the centrality of love. Though tradition records his attempted martyrdom 'at the Latin Gate' in Rome, St John lived to a great age, spent many years in exile on Patmos and finally died in Ephesus.

The Holy Innocents, Martyrs (Feast) – 28 December:

The Holy Innocents were the young children of the neighbourhood of Bethlehem, all under the age of two, put to death by Herod in an attempt to kill the Infant Jesus. Some ancient texts number the victims in the thousands but in all probability there were no more than two dozen. On this Feast of 'Childermas', while still in the Christmas Octave, these innocent, nameless victims are honoured as the first to shed their blood for Christ.

St Thomas Becket, Bishop and Martyr, Patron of Pastoral Clergy in England and Wales (Feast) – 29 December:

St Thomas (1118-1170) was born in Cheapside, London and rose to become Henry II's chancellor and (from 1162) Archbishop of Canterbury. His episcopal consecration sparked off a religious conversion; he changed from being 'a patron of play-actors and a follower of hounds to being a shepherd of souls'. His final years were dedicated to defending the rights of the Church, which led to disagreements with the King and resulted in six years of exile. Shortly after returning to Canterbury, he was murdered by agents of the king in his own cathedral on 29 December 1170. St Thomas was canonised three years later and is honoured as patron of the pastoral clergy in England.

Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God – 1 January:

The Octave of Christmas ends on the first day of the new year, which is dedicated to the Blessed Virgin, venerated as the Mother of God. The Gospel reminds us that she 'kept all these things, pondering them in her heart' (Lk 2:19). So she did in Bethlehem, on Golgotha at the foot of the cross, and on the day of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit descended in the Upper room. And so she does today too. The Mother of God and of human beings keeps in her heart all of humanity's problems, great and difficult, and meditates upon them. The Alma Redemptorist Mater walks with us and guides us with motherly tenderness towards the future. Thus she helps humanity cross all the 'thresholds' of the years, the centuries, the millenniums, by sustaining their hope in the One who is the Lord of history.

Ss Basil the Great and Gregory Nazianzen, Bishops and Doctors of the Church (Memorial) – 2 January:

St Basil (c.330-379) was born into a saintly family in Caesarea, Cappadocia (Turkey); his brother was St Gregory of Nyssa, also a notable theologian. For some years St Basil lived in a monastic community before becoming Bishop of Caesarea in 370. He was a keen defender of the reality of the Incarnation against attacks from Arian heretics. St Basil also gave his name to a Liturgy and a set of monastic rules which are still used in the East.

St Gregory Nazianzen (330-390), a friend of St Basil, was also from Cappadocia and involved in countering the Arian heresy. In 381 he became Bishop of Constantinople, although he had to retire to his native Nazianzus due to opposition. He was called 'The Theologian' because of his great learning and talent for oratory.

The Most Holy Name of Jesus (Opt Mem) – 3 January:

On the day of his Circumcision the Lord received the name Jesus, meaning 'God saves.' Devotion to the Holy Name was popularised in the fifteenth century by St Bernadine of Siena and St John Capistrano, who both carried the monogram of Jesus (HIS) with them on their preaching tours. We honour the Holy Name not only because it is the name of our Saviour but because it is, in itself, a powerful prayer.
